# Chit Chat from the Chair

Finally the weather seems to be warming up! What with the very wet Spring, a month's rain in the first week of May then none for the rest of the month my plants seem to be confused. My veg seeds seem to have been germinating randomly and I've no idea why. Still, now most things are in the ground, and I'm just trying to get and keep the weeds under control and await the produce.

In the previous chit chat I promised an update on my direct sowing of seeds for veg. Brassicas seem to have been just as good as those sown in trays and having planted many out have good root and top. They do need more water when first planted but that's not unexpected. French beans had such poor germination I ended up pre-germinating the seed and growing them on in the greenhouse. Leeks are very similar whether sown in the greenhouse or outside- I'll certainly be growing these in a seed bed rather than in the greenhouse in future.

There is a brief report of the trip to Shuttleworth in this magazine but I was disappointed in the poor response from members. However, there are also suggestions on how we may be able to provide trips in future.

Those of you who may have visited the Seed Box will have seen how large the care home building is. I don't think the committee had fully appreciated the scale of it until now. To date there has been little or no disruption to the FGA and we have a good working relationship with the builder. In fact they have been offering their services to unload our bulk delivery and move pallets of compost from our compound onto our car park saving us a lot of work. The needs of the building project have recently led to some narrowing of our access road, so please drive carefully and DO NOT PARK ON THE GRASS VERGE. If you only need small items then please turn left into the allotments and park there just inside the gate.

There have been some recent small changes in the FGA: First: I'd like to thank Carolyn and Alan for their period as Magazine Editors. I'm glad to be able to welcome Ian who is taking over as Magazine Editor from this issue. Second: I'd like to thank Kath for her long stint as membership secretary. I'm very pleased to welcome Francis who has taken this role on. To date the change has been seamless so thanks to them both for managing the handover so well.

I seem to remember that Tesco once had, and my still have, a policy that if their tills were busy they would open additional tills until either they run out of staff or tills. I'm delighted to say that the FGA has the same policy. I'm sad to say it's less obvious because we only have one till, please be patient when we are very busy. One suggestion is come later in our two hours of trading as it's normally quieter then.

### 2023 FGA AGM

Thankfully we were able to hold an in-person AGM this year and 18 members attended with a further 6 sending their apologies.

The chairman, Jim Godden, thanked everyone for attending and that the construction of the care home was not causing too many problems to the operation of the Seed box. Farrans, the builders, had used one of their forklifts on bulk delivery day to move all the pallets to the required places and subsequently moving things from the compound to the Seed box. He also reported that we'd organized a guided tour of Swiss Gardens for members but so far not too much interest had been shown.

The membership report showed that we currently have 246 compared to 262 at the same time last year. 80 members have not renewed for 2023 but we have had 64 new joiners during the year.

Jim then thanked Carolyn and Alan Kirkdale and Sue Livens for all their hard work on the committee, as they are standing down. Francis Prior is joining the committee to take on the Membership Secretary role and Sue Foster is joining the Show Committee.

Discussions took place concerning parking at the Seed box, wood cladding requirements for building renovation, the removal of offers on bulk buys of compost and some changes to the FGA rules.

It was also mentioned that some volunteers at the Seed box had suffered verbal abuse from members. All present agreed that this will not be tolerated and if it occurs the incident should be reported to the key holder for the Executive to take appropriate action against the member.

Finally for his many years of service to the FGA Laurie Arnold was given life membership.

You'll soon be receiving the Show Schedule which lists the many vegetable, fruit, flower, home produce / cooking, arts and crafts, homemade wine, photographic and children's classes. So there's a class (or classes) for everyone.

On the day, check the schedule to find out how many items you need to bring along for your chosen class(es) – generally, the more similar they are to each other, the better. When you arrive for 'Staging', between 09:00-11:45, there will be plenty of FGA helpers and your fellow exhibitors on hand to answer any questions you have. You can enter any classes but, if you've never exhibited at one of our shows before (or have never won a first prize in the main flower and vegetable sections), then you might like to start in the Novice vegetable or flower classes. As an introduction to exhibiting, they're ideal- you have a good chance of not only getting a rosette, but, depending on the standard of entry, maybe winning the Novice trophy, which you hold for a year.

## Shuttleworth trip report

21st May 2023. Weather forecast fine and dry. Pick up two car sharers and we're off on the not long trek to Shuttleworth clutching our tickets. 25 minutes later: here we are. Go and find our guide, oh not one but two, we're spoiled. Collect tickets which include a 30 day entry to the garden and aircraft hangers on non-air show days, and a drinks voucher for the café with each ticket. We were actually the first tour they had done for some time as, like so many organisations, they have lost quite a lot of volunteers since Covid but it barely showed.

A little early, we go into the Swiss Garden after a brief introduction in the reception building. Having never been to the garden before I had no preconceived ideas as to what was there. Just inside the entrance gate, pick up the guide brochure, nice reminder of the highlights but not really needed. For those who know it, skip the next bit. It is not a huge garden, as it is not a formal garden, but is the garden of the house and evolved over many years and owners. The guides complemented each other with one most knowledgeable on the garden and the other on the history. Many vistas and viewpoints were suggested which would have not been obvious without the guides. I thought it was an excellent morning.

So, afterwards, outside for lunch, and that free drink, shame the wind was so cold but it was sunny. Then the afternoon was spent on a leisurely wander around the hangers looking at the amazing collection of planes.

For me the shame was that, although we only had 14 tickets available and the FGA sold the tickets for exactly what we had pre-paid, we could only sell half the tickets. Normal day tickets cost £15.50, tea/coffee £2.50(ish), guided tours not available (our price £25 pp). Remember even the best author of a small free guide cannot tell you much and certainly cannot say 'look up now and.....' and it definitely cannot answer questions. But our excellent guides could do both and more. Based on the above trip I can now answer a question often asked in the Seed Box, 'Why don't the FGA organise trips any more?'. The answer is above.

However, as a committee we want to provide whatever we can for members. We are affiliated to the RHS which allows one free group visit a year to an RHS gardens. The nearest RHS Gardens are Hyde Hall in Essex (normal entry price £13.85) and Wisley (normal entry price £16.50) which is just off the A3/M25 Junction. Please note these are group visits and we must enter as a group. The best plan we can think of is to drive there in cars, meet in the public area to form the group. It would be good to try and car share to minimise the cost (Coach hire has become too expensive for it to really be an option). If you are interested please let us know and we will try and organise something.
